

WHAT TO EXPECT

Absences

In order to be eligible to receive credit in a course, a student shall miss no more than 6 days per semester. Attendance is taken every period. Greater than 6 unexcused absences will result in a failing grade in the course.

Assemblies

Assemblies are held in the auditorium. Each grade has an assigned section. Freshman sit in the balcony during these assemblies.

There are 2 different bells. The first bell sends you to your next class. The second bell is the tardy bell. Students have a 4 minute passing period. Failure to arrive to class on time will result in a lunch detention. No loitering in the hallways.

Cell Phones

Cell Phones are strictly prohibited during all school hours. If a cell phone is taken by a teacher, the student must pay \$15 at the front office at the end of the day to retrieve the phone.

Checking In/Out

A parent or guardian must call the school and grant permission for the student to leave if the student drives. A student that doesn't drive can only be picked up by a parent or guardian. Students must sign in or out on the sheets at the attendance desk when leaving or returning to campus. Students cannot be checked out after 2:00.

C.O.R.E.

C.O.R.E. is a 30 minute RTI period between 3rd and 4th hour. C.O.R.E. stands for clubs, opportunities, remediation and enrichment. This period will be utilized for a myriad of activities throughout the year. Each subject will have a priority day for remediation work. Students will also have daily opportunities for enrichment and extracurricular activities if their academic work is on track.

Dress Code

The Dress Code is as follows:

White/gray collared and button up shirts

Khaki/navy pants, shorts, or skirts

Dresses must have a collar or a collared shirt underneath

NO cargo pants

NO flip flops

NO sweatshirts or pullovers

Shoes must have a back strap

No colored undershirts

On spirit days, students may wear PHS spirit shirt and jeans for \$1.

Email Address

All students in Rapides Parish have a Google email address administered by the district.

Feather Forms

If a student is absent for a class, the student must get a feather form from Mr. Hood at the front table in the lobby before 7:15 a.m. A feather form is required for excused absences. A student must have a feather form to enter the class or a lunch detention will be issued to the student.

Food/Drink

Food and drinks are not allowed in the academic building with the exception of water in a clear container. Vending machines are open during lunch. They are located in the lobby of the boy's gym.

Google Classroom

Many teachers use Google Classroom as an extension of their classroom. Students have an opportunity to access class documents and submit assignments. Teachers will give their students the access code to join their class.

Guidance

The guidance department is located in the main office. The ninth grade advisor is Mrs. Beaubouef.

Homeroom

Students will report to homeroom every day during the first week of school. Report cards will be handed out during a homeroom time at the end of each grading period.

ID Badge

All students must wear an ID badge every day. A student can purchase a temporary badge for \$1 from Mrs. Yates at the attendance desk before 7:15 a.m. Failure to wear an ID badge will result in lunch detention. Replacement badges are \$5.

Library

The Library is open to students before school and during lunch. It opens at 7 a.m. each morning. In order to take an AR test, a student must get a pass from his or her English teacher before entering the Library.

Lunch Detention

Lunch detention will be held during each lunch shift. First lunch detention will be in room 1078 and second lunch shift detention will be in room 2010. Lunch detentions may be assigned by teachers for tardies, dress code violation, and any other minor offenses in lieu of a referral.

Lunch

If a student's 5th hour is on the first floor, they eat on first lunch shift. If a student's 5th hour is on the second floor, they will eat on second lunch shift. The music building and JROTC building will eat on second lunch shift. The bathrooms that will be used during lunch are located in the commons area and the gym. **STUDENTS ARE PROHIBITED FROM ENTERING THE ACADEMIC BUILDING.**

M2M Connections

Mentor/Mentee Connections occur monthly throughout the school year. It is an opportunity for freshmen to connect and learn valuable lessons from their upper class mentor. M2M Connections happen during CORE.

Nurse

There is no official nurse on campus. If there is a medical emergency, report it to the attendance office.

Op-Sub

Op-sub is a classroom assigned for students to report to if the teacher is absent. All students must report to their assigned Op-Sub teacher. Failure to do so will result in disciplinary action.

Parent/Student Portal

This is a website for students and parents to check grades and attendance. Each student's username and password will be given to him or her by their English teacher. If you previously attended a school in Rapides Parish, the user name and password are the same.

Parking

Student parking is ONLY permitted on Rebel Hill. If a student is getting dropped off in the morning, the driver is suggested to circle around the front.


Pep Rallies


Pep rallies are on Fridays of home football games in the boy's gym. Each grade has an assigned section in the bleachers. Freshmen sit directly to the left. Pep rallies begin at 2:00.

 Basketball is a sports team for both boys and girls. To join, you must try out. For more information contact Mr. Sears (boys) and Ms. T. Edmondson (girls).


 Bass Club is a group that is part of the largest bass fishing organization in the world. They fish at local and state tournaments. See Mr. Wilkinson for more information.


 Cross Country is a team that runs long distance races. To join, you have to show up to tryouts with a willingness to run. Contact Mr. Taylor.
